
But, with the toxic brew of over-the-top destructive partisanship in Washington today, the joke isn't funny anymore.





Celebrating Beaujolais Nouveau

When "Beaujolais Nouveau" is released for market midnight on the third Thursday of November, it is the signal for the start of a race by road, rail, sea and air to get 60 million bottles delivered on time to over 80 countries across the five continents.

Beaujolais Nouveau Day is marked in France on the third Thursday in November with fireworks, music and festivals. Under French law, the wine is released at 12:01 a.m., just weeks after the wine's grapes have been harvested. Parties are held throughout the country to celebrate the first wine of the season.

Beaujolais Nouveau – that much-ballyhooed cherry-red coloured vintage that's best served chilled — is clearly not for wine snobs. This fresh and fruity red is the result of a quick fermentation process that ends up with a tasty, clean wine that is enjoyed by palates the world over.

The Black Gamay grapes that go into Beaujolais Nouveau are handpicked in the Beaujolais province of France. The wine actually originated about a century ago as a cheap and cheerful drink produced by locals to celebrate the end of the harvest season.

Perhaps the most well-known producer of Beaujolais Nouveau is Georges Duboeuf, who is credited as one of the marketing geniuses behind the wine. Selling this young red was viewed by some vintners as a means to clear large quantities of wine at decent profits, which would create a much-needed cash flow shortly after harvest.


The idea of a race to Paris carrying the first bottles of the new vintage was conceived and this attracted much media attention. By the 1970s, the race became a national event. The races spread to neighbouring countries in Europe in the 1980s, followed by North America, and in the 1990s, to Asia.

Today, there are several dozen vintners making this popular red. The Beaujolais region is 34 miles long from north to south and 7 to 9 miles wide and home to nearly 4,000 vineyards which produce twelve officially-designated types of Beaujolais known as AOCs. They include some of the finest and priciest grand crus (big vintage) wines around, including Fleurie and Cote de Brouilly. The most common two are the Beaujolais and Beaujolais-Villages, the former of which account for half of the region's annual output.

In 2010, 35 million bottles of the wine were put on the market. Some 7.5 million were sold in French supermarkets and 15.5 million were exported mainly to Japan, Germany and the United States.

Beaujolais Nouveau owes its easy drinkability to a winemaking process called carbonic maceration, also known as whole-berry fermentation. This technique preserves the fresh, fruity quality of the grapes without extracting bitter tannins from the grape skins.

Enjoy the pleasures of the harvest!

identified as western hubs. Across the state, political leaders and legislators sought to connect the lead mines of southwestern Wisconsin to the ships in Milwaukee. Milwaukee railroads fought back competitors from Sheboygan, Green Bay, Racine, Southport and even Chicago. Dominant railroad lines in the state included the Chicago and Northwestern, the Wisconsin Central Railway/Soo Line, the Green Bay and Western and the Milwaukee Road.

In the 1930's, Milwaukee gave rise to several companies and one organization that brought the love of railroads into the family home. Model railroading brought trains into attics and living rooms, and Milwaukee was at the heart of the hobby. Wm. K Walthers founded his company, Walthers Model Railroad Equipment in 1932 on Erie Street, and his company was at the forefront of model railroading.

In 1935, Walthers and several others founded the National Model Railroad Association (NMRA) in Milwaukee. Members of this group gathered to share the craftsmanship and artistry involved in model railroading. Details in painting, carving, designing and research were showcased at regular meetings and gatherings. Today, the same NMRA is involved in the hobby and business of model railroading, and is active in Canada, Australia, Great Britain and the Netherlands.

Another major figure of influence in model railroading, A.C. Kalmbach, was also a native of Milwaukee, and started a publishing company there in the 1930's. Kalmbach was a founder of the NMRA and developed a number of magazines dedicated to sharing information about model railroading. Historical detail and accuracy, creativity in layouts, artistry in painting and details in construction were all described in some of the classic publications that are still produced at Kalmbach Publishing.

Over the next decades, railroads changed and so did model railroading, but people were fascinated by the lure of the rails. In 1971, Trainfest began as an event for Milwaukee area railroad enthusiasts to display their layouts and continue to share the romance of the rails with each other.



Thanksgiving Proclamation Address

of 1863

by the President Abraham Lincoln

The year that is drawing toward its close has been filled with the blessings of fruitful years and healthful skies. To these bounties, which are so constantly enjoyed that we are prone to forget the source from which they come, others have been added which are of so extraordinary a nature that they can not fail to penetrate and soften even the heart which is habitually insensible...

In the midst of a civil war of unequaled magnitude and severity, which has sometimes seemed to foreign States to invite and to provoke their aggression, peace has been preserved with all nations, order has been maintained, the laws have been respected and obeyed, and harmony has prevailed everywhere ... Needful diversions of wealth and of strength from the fields of peaceful industry to the national defense have not arrested the plough, the shuttle or the ship; the axe has enlarged the borders of our settlements, and the mines, as well of iron and coal as of the precious metals, have yielded even more abundantly than heretofore.

Population has steadily increased... and the country, rejoicing in the consciousness of augmented strength and vigor, is permitted to expect continuance of years with large increase of freedom....

It has seemed to me fit and proper that they should be solemnly, reverently and gratefully acknowledged as with one heart and one voice by the whole American People. I do therefore invite my fellow citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next, as a day of Thanksgiving...

How to Turn a 'Liability' Into a Source of Power

Leadership Mentor Shares 4 Tips for Harnessing Your Feelings

Emotional Sensual Intuitive

Society tends to treat these "feminine" qualities as liabilities; traits that should be suppressed and discouraged because they make us appear "weak." "Those characteristics are in fact the foundations of our feminine power," says Leela Francis, author of "Woman's Way Home," (www.VividlyWoman.com). By resourcing the power within one's own body, Francis teaches, "a woman can have the life of her dreams." One of the ways to do that is to master the world of your emotions.

"Emotional power is the freedom to feel the truth of your feelings and the ability to harness them," Francis says. Denying, suppressing or expressing emotion to manipulate others all stifle this wellspring of potential for depth and intimacy, which is a source of mental, physical and spiritual joy. What can you do to begin reclaiming your own emotional power? Francis offers these suggestions.

Indulge your emotions without dumping them on others. When you digest food, your body absorbs the nutritious elements and expels the potentially toxic wastes. Emotions must be digested the same way. It's important to express your feelings in responsible ways so that you don't build up emotional toxins and pollutants in your body. This may be why anxiety, depression and panic attacks have become so prevalent in our culture, Francis says. Some healthy, responsible ways to express emotion include creative endeavors, such as the visual arts – painting, drawing, sculpting; expressive arts such as singing and dancing; and healing arts such as massage.

Don't demand others witness your emotional expression; and don't allow others to demand you witness theirs. Using emotional expression to evoke responses from others is manipulative and does not allow you to experience the truth of your feelings. Crying, yelling, even pretending to be happy when you're not in order to influence someone else's behavior are abuses of emotional expression. We denied the benefits of expression, we have to live with our own lack of integrity for using them irresponsibly.
